**ENDORSEMENT OF THE 25 BY 2025+5 IMPLEMENTATION PLAN
(Agenda Item 5.1)**

1. BACKGROUND

Attached for the consideration and approval of the 121st Special Meeting of the COTED-Agriculture is the implementation plan of the extended 25 by 2025 food security initiative now 25 by 25 +5 which will commence from 2026 and end in 2030. The implementation plan covers all the Member States who have submitted national targets in support of the overall regional goal of reducing the Region's food import bill. The implementation plan and targets are predicated on the following strategic directions:

- Continued Food Import Bill Reduction
- Increased Primary Production for Intra-Regional Trade
- Improved Intra-Regional Technical Cooperation

Collectively, the Region aims to meet a food production target of 4,345,040 Metric Tonnes by 2030. The full details of the 25 by 2025+5 plan are attached in Annex 1 to this document.

ANNEX I

IMPLEMENTATION PLAN FOR THE CARICOM 25 BY 2025 +5 FOOD SECURITY INITIATIVE

1. BACKGROUND

At its 49th Regular Meeting, the Conference of Heads of Government agreed to extend the CARICOM 25 by 2025 Initiative to 2030. This extension allows the Region to:

- Secure greater and more sustained funding for regional food security from Member States.
- Consolidate and expand on the gains and goodwill achieved to date.
- Broaden stakeholder participation across the Region.
- Deepen involvement and investment support from the Regional private sector.
- Strengthen human capacity in both farming communities and Ministries of Agriculture.
- Eliminate remaining barriers to regional trade in agricultural products.
- Enhance assessment and monitoring of progress in Member States.
- Expand regional research and development capabilities.
- Increase uptake of the Regional Agricultural Insurance product.
- Complete and operationalize a responsive regional transportation and logistics system.
- Advance the adoption of digitalization across agri-food systems, including trade processes, production, and marketing.
- Enact cross-cutting regional policies to support investment, business establishment, and free movement of people.

Vision 25% by 2025 is a long-term social and economic partnership among Member States, the Regional Private Sector (via the CARICOM Private Sector Organization – CPSO), Regional Organizations, Producer Groups, Development Partners, and Civil Society. It sets out the actions and areas of intervention needed to reduce the Region's food import bill,

expand intra-regional trade, and create wealth and economic opportunity across all CARICOM Member States.

The **Special Ministerial Taskforce on Food Production and Food Security (MTF)** guides implementation of the Vision. Comprising Ministers of Agriculture from across the Region, the MTF meets monthly to steer the transformation of the agri-food system into one that is resilient, investment-friendly, and capable of guaranteeing food and nutrition security for CARICOM citizens.

2. UPDATE ON THE 25 BY 2025 INITIATIVE

The CARICOM 25 by 2025 Initiative has made commendable progress in strengthening agricultural production and food security, despite challenges such as climate variability, rising input costs, and global market shocks. The MTF, established by the Conference in 2021, has provided vital leadership in promoting commercialization and attracting investment to the regional agri-food sector. Notable achievements include:

- Hosting of two highly successful Agriculture Investment Forums and Expos (Guyana and Trinidad and Tobago), which laid the groundwork for investments and governance mechanisms.
- Approval and implementation of critical regional policies:
 - Trade Policy for Animal and Animal Products
 - Regional Agricultural Health and Food Safety Policy
 - SPS Guidelines and Alternate SPS Settlement Mechanism
 - Regional Guidelines for 19 Agricultural Commodities
 - Introduction of regional agricultural insurance mechanisms.
- Establishment of cross-border agricultural investments.
- Creation of a **US\$100M Regional Agriculture Fund**.

- Launch of the **Caribbean Food Systems Investment Initiative (CFSII)**, in collaboration with 17 Asset Management, to mobilize US\$75M for regional agriculture.
- Expansion of cold storage facilities and soy/corn storage (to 27,000 tonnes).
- Rehabilitation of soil laboratories and development of solar drying facilities.
- Establishment of new hatcheries in Guyana with a capacity of 1M chicks annually.
- Expansion of the beef and small ruminant sectors.
- Enhanced technical cooperation among Member States.
- US\$5.2M in agricultural loans in Trinidad and Tobago.
- Construction of a **US\$20M milk and dairy facility** in Guyana.
- Increased resource mobilization and coordination toward implementation of the initiative.
- Large-scale private sector investments in dairy, small ruminants, soy, and poultry.
- Development of a **Regional Youth in Agriculture Strategy**.
- Growth in agricultural production and introduction of niche crops in Member States.
- Establishment of a **Regional Electronic Agriculture Market Information System**.
- Expanded technical assistance programmes between Member States.
- Improved alignment of development partners with regional food and nutrition security priorities.
- Investment in greenhouse technology and cold storage across the Region.

3. **2025 OBJECTIVES AND REGIONAL TARGETS: 25 BY 2025 +5 (TO 2030)**

The new phase of the initiative (25 by 2025 +5) builds on these gains and opens new opportunities to advance food and nutrition security. The programme will focus on:

- **Continued Food Import Bill Reduction:** Deepening import substitution across the priority commodities identified under the original initiative.

- **Increased Primary Production for Intra-Regional Trade:** Scaling up production of crops and livestock of economic importance to meet regional demand, supported by expanded technical cooperation and knowledge exchange.
- **Improved Intra-Regional Technical Cooperation:** Facilitating greater value from the initiative through direct trade negotiations between Member States and digital tools such as the Regional Agricultural Electronic Market Information System, which connects producers with buyers.

Collectively, the Region aims to meet a food production target of **4,345,040 Metric Tonnes by 2030**. *Table 1* below presents the production targets by commodity.

5. Partnerships

The MTF will engage the Regional Private Sector, foreign investors, international and regional institutional partners and the Diplomatic Community with a view towards formulating effective partnerships to take the work forward.

Table 3 below summarizes the key stakeholder types to be engaged, the purpose of engagement, the mechanisms for engagement and the timeline for engagement.

The private sector will initially be engaged for consensus building on the priority products to be targeted, based on business cases already developed and re-alignment with priorities identified by Heads; and for a more practical determination of the investment and fiscal support required for each sector. This will be broadly with the CPSO and with sector-specific stakeholders as may be necessary.

4. MONITORING FRAMEWORK

Table 4 summarizes the monitoring framework. Overall implementation of the regional plan for commercialization of the Regional Agri-food Systems will be guided by the MTF. The Special Ministerial Task Force on Food Production and Food Security responsibilities and reporting obligations will be guided by its Terms of Reference as was developed and agreed in 2021. Ministers will receive technical support from their focal points identified at the national level. The private sector will engage regional policy makers at the Ministerial and technical levels as may be required to facilitate implementation of the business cases already developed and to address any hurdles being experienced. Similarly, an electronic reporting and monitoring system has been developed to assist with the quality, consistency and time submission of reports to the MTF.

5. COMMUNICATION FRAMEWORK

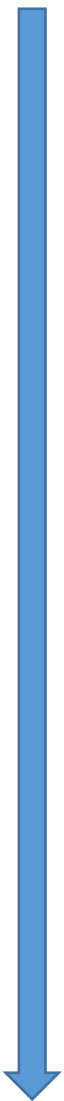
